
#### **Fall Festival of Death**

### **Competitions!**

Our club participates in several competitions throughout the year with other lower mainland clubs. The first will be the Delta Print Challenge. Usually held towards the end of November, this is a **print** competition. Since we have not yet received a formal invitation to complete this year, we will assume we are invited and will select our prints at the **first meeting in November**. We will also assume the rules are the same. Our club will be looking for **ten** prints, each from a different member. The **minimum print** size is 6" X 9"; the **minimum matte** size is 11" X 14". The **maximum print and maximum matt** sizes are 16" X 20". All prints must be backed with 4-ply matte board and matted (except for 16 X 20 prints where it would be... impossible). Topic is open, colour or black and white, digital, film, commercial or self-processed. We've heard Wal-Mart makes quite good 11 X 14 prints for a very reasonable price. Remember, in print competitions, an 8 X 10 has less impact unless it is very simple.

Judging for this competition is usually held at the Longhouse at the Delta Rec. Centre in Tsawwassen. It's worth attending; we'll let you know when we have more information.

Today's society seems to encourage specialists and it's certainly satisfying to be accomplished in something, whether it is cycling or gardening. And even in the diverse field of photography, most people quickly settle into what they like to photograph, whether it is a commercial aim like weddings or a hobby preference like flowers. Finding a niche in photography can be a good thing, but having knowledge about a wide range of subjects can expand your enjoyment and opportunities. Skills get rusty, so if you haven't recently used fill flash (or flash) or practiced panning or taken macros or done a portrait, you may miss a once-in-a-lifetime shot, or a job opportunity....

When I taught beginner photographers, year after year the majority wanted to know how to take better baby and holiday pictures. When I showed them how to minimize background distractions, optimize exposure, avoid dark shadows, flash falloff, etc. they were happy. But I also showed them many examples of other subjects they could photograph, and it was good to share their pleasure when they brought in close-ups of cutlery or birds-eye views of the street.

Our club provides a stress-free learning and sharing environment for whatever photographic subjects or techniques you wish to explore. You don't have to show us exhibition-quality work; you can bring in a work in progress for feedback. Take advantage of our workshops and outings as opportunities to "see", learn and experience something new, interesting and exciting, something that may lead you to a different path or new opportunities.

### **History in Photographs**

One of the most captivating aspects of photography is the capture of history. Most museum archives have a wealth of photographs. Recently, the Vancouver Sun featured Vancouver photographs from Vancouver's past. What changes...
