Recently, I changed the photo on my computer desktop. I use two monitors (both pretty ancient by today's standards, and calibration? What calibration?). What is interesting is that one is brighter and less contrasty than the other, so that for any particular image, one monitor will provide more of a "wow" factor or reveal detail that really changes the impression of the photo. It can quickly show me what aspect of an image controls the impact. I'm certainly not recommending that you go out and find two uncalibrated, unmatched monitors. But it does demonstrate that sometimes playing with contrast, exposure, saturation can surprise you, even if you had a particular goal in mind.

Simplicity (Peter Ellis)

In March we shall be selecting our club-entry images for the Fraser Valley Invitational Challenge, where this year's theme is Simplicity.

But what is meant by Simplicity? My big fat dictionary just defines it as "The fact or condition of being simple", which isn't much help to us.

In the art world it is often linked with Minimalism, which suggests that elements of a composition – the shape, colour or location of an object in the frame – should be eliminated unless they are essential to convey the point of the image.

Perhaps we don't need to go that far but, photographically, I think it means we should get rid of the visual clutter and trivia that may complicate the message or confuse the viewer, just as too many many words in a sentence can lose the reader. For instance, if a person is drowning, do they shout "Please will someone come to my assistance" - or simply "Help"? The message is the same, but in fewer words.

In the images I've used to illustrate this, there may be details that catch the eye but the overall effect (the message) is clear.

Remember – less can be more, if you keep it simple.
